PentecostIn this unit the children will explore the story of Pentecost and the transformation in their lives after receiving the gift of the Holy Spirit.Prayer Children will learn about some styles of prayer and be able to reflect on some of their experiences of prayer during the school year.	 This half term Reception will: Recall some basic throws. Negotiate space and obstacles safely, with consideration for themselves and others. Demonstrate strength, balance and coordination when playing. Move energetically, such as running, jumping, dancing, hopping, skipping and climbing. Hold a pencil effectively in preparation for fluent writing – using the tripod grip in almost all cases. Use a range of small tools, including scissors, paint brushes and cutlery. Begin to show accuracy and care when drawing.

This half term Reception will: Join in with repeated refrain and anticipates key events and phrases in rhyme and stories. Respond to simple instructions e.g. to get or put away an object. Use intonation, rhythm and phrasing to make the meaning clear to others.	This half term Reception will: Select and use activities and resources with help when needed. Become more outgoing with unfamiliar people in the safe context of their setting. Show more confidence in new social situations. Play with one or more other children, extending and elaborating play ideas. Develop appropriate ways of being assertive. Talk with others to solve conflicts.

Identify a variety of ways in which particular effects can be achieved when creating with materials. Safely use and explore a variety of materials, tools and techniques, experimenting with colour, design, texture, form and function. Share their creations, explaining the process they have used.
