Y4: How does God want me to treat my neighbour?





Impact

By the end of this unit children will...

The children will be exploring the life of Anglo-Saxons and their settlements in Britain. They will explore the spread of Christianity across Britain and they will use this new knowledge to identify if the person buried at Sutton Hoo was Christian or pagan, they will then learn about the probable identity of this person. They will find out about the Scots and Picts, learning about who they were and how their cultures differed, despite their close proximity. They will identity how they treated each other and why there were tensions between the two.

Sound:

The children will be learning to:

- identify how sounds are made, associating some of them with something vibrating
- recognise that vibrations from sounds travel through a medium to the ear
- find patterns between the pitch of a sound and features of the object that produced it
- find patterns between the volume of a sound and the strength of the vibrations that produced it
- recognise that sounds get fainter as the distance from the sound source increases
